Lifelong Connections: Permanency for Older Youth

Instructor: Deanna Prezioso
CAPS LMS Session ID: 11480

When planning for permanency with adolescents, we have to think and use approaches differently from when planning for younger children. Permanency for older youth is not centered around the living arrangement; it is not simply providing independent living services; and it is not just offering adoption. Instead, it provides youth with the opportunity to forge lifelong permanent connections to people they identify as important. This training allows participants to experience the impact of permanent connections and grasp why they are important. Finally, participants will come to understand how adolescent development relates to permanency.

Separation, Grief and Loss

Instructor: Angela Irby CAPS LMS Session ID: 12182

This course helps participants understand the impact of separation and ambiguous loss, and the different ways children grieve. Life-long grieving and the importance of providing opportunities for grieving is explored. Strategies to help children deal with grief and loss are identified. Participants will understand loss and fractured attachments with birth family members and previous placements; recognize the importance of establishing and maintaining essential relationships with and for children; understand the impact of frequent moves and the importance of managing transitions for children; and understand the separation, grief and loss experienced by all members of the foster/adoption network.

It can feel challenging to assess prospective adoptive parents who will be adopting a transracial child. Following MEPA (Multiethnic Placement Act) regulations may leave workers feeling perplexed about how to discuss race or racism during assessment or preparation with parents. This course seeks to address some of those concerns by exploring how to best support transracially adoptive families through exploring best practices, gleamed from adoptees themselves. As vital members of the adoptive family's journey, workers will also explore how systemic racism seeps its way into their work and result in unconscious biases. However, with understanding and the development of cultural humility, workers will be able to better support adoptive families around the issues of race and racism. With that understanding, adoptive parents and transracial adoptees will then have much better outcomes.

It will give space, time and suggestions for participants to develop a strategic approach to dealing with the underlying issues behind power struggles.

With the experience he gained while interviewing or interrogating thousands of drug traffickers and drug abuses, he has come to the realization that enforcement of drug crimes is not the solution to the drug epidemic plaguing our country today. Instead, the answer lies with education to change the culture of drug abuse in our society. This passion for drug education is evident during his instruction. He has lectured throughout the United States at a variety of national conferences, seminars, and drug-free workplace education with an emphasis on front line supervisors and managers. Shawn has completed training on conducting drug investigations in Quantico, Virginia, San Diego, California, El Paso, Texas, and Columbus, Ohio. He has attended several schools and seminars related to narcotics across the country.
