SAFE & TOGETHER: DOMESTIC VIOLENCE-INFORMED DOCUMENTATION AND CASE PLANNING

CONTENT:

This workshop continues to explore the Safe and Together Model approach to child welfare cases involving intimate partner violence. Day three builds on content from days 1 and 2 by reinforcing the model's basic concepts on domestic violence-informed assessment and interviewing and introducing participants to skills and strategies for documenting these unique cases. Participants will learn to use the Mapping Perpetrator's Patterns tool, a comprehensive approach for recording the impact of domestic violence on all members of the family. They will also learn to differentiate between domestic violence-informed and domestic violence-destructive practice and to connect the ways domestic violence intersects with other family issues, such as mental health and substance abuse, and larger societal issues like racism and sexism. Day 4 reinforces the topics covered in days 1-3 and introduces participants to key elements of domestic violence-informed case planning, which places an emphasis on natural and informal resources the family may already have. The day covers case planning techniques for perpetrators, survivors and children and brings together the concepts from the whole training into a comprehensive action plan that participants can begin enacting immediately in their own practice.

CASE DOCUMENTATION AND EFFECTIVE CASE WRITING

Documentation is one of the primary duties of a caseworker, because workers are responsible for documenting all interactions with clients, including phone calls, home visits, interactions with collateral contacts, and more. Since workers are unable to write down everything a client says or does, it is essential to be able to summarize and document the highlights of each contact. These notes, while written and documented at the time of the incident, could be used at a later time, such as during a court appearance; therefore, well-written notes that are clear and concise are essential for all child welfare workers. This training is an interactive training, which allows workers to develop skills to improve their case documentation.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND BEYOND FOR CASEWORKERS

This workshop will focus on the different types of missing persons, analyze the profiles and vulnerability factors of "victims," recruitment and grooming tactics used in both sexual and labor trafficking, terminology, and rules associated with pimping subcultures. This workshop will provide tips on how to identify and interact with "victims." Participants will review legislative changes in Ohio and the nation, and consider the impact of social media on how business is done. Finally, using numerous case studies, participants will learn some common problems and pitfalls associated with attempts to match deceased persons with missing persons. Participants are encouraged to bring their smartphones and tablets to this workshop so they may participate in the workshop activities.

In this course, assessors will build on the knowledge obtained in the course Introduction to the Homestudy and learn about the elements of a complete homestudy. Required verifications and forms will be reviewed, and strategies for completion will be introduced. Assessors will explore opportunities for furthering engagement with families and assessment beyond the family interview. This course will encourage the development of critical thinking skills and incorporate guided practice scenarios to help assessors feel confident in their ability to complete the homestudy.

SPECIALIZED, THIRD-PARTY, AND ONGOING CASE INVESTIGATIONS

Through a combination of lectures, discussions, and activities, learners will be equipped with the knowledge to effectively manage and document specialized investigations within the Ohio Statewide Automated Child Welfare Information System (Ohio SACWIS).

SAFETY IN THE DISTRICT FOR DIRECT SERVICE WORKERS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW TO STAY SAFE

CONTENT:

This safety in the district class will provide evidenced-based information on how direct service workers can better protect themselves when in the field and while on home visits. What can be done to assist in your own safety, and how to prepare for a safe home visit. Areas that will be covered are: increasing awareness, assessing the vulnerability in different settings, when to get assistance, how to de-escalate an escalating situation, and developing prevention plans.

THE IMPACT OF SOCIAL MEDIA ON YOUTH: GOING VIRAL

CONTENT:

Throughout history technology has always served as a significant contributor and a catalyst for shaping global cultures. The proliferation of social media, smart phones, and digital communication represent much of our growing dependency on technology. While it is easy to identify the benefits that come from these advances, there remains significant concerns regarding the impact of social media specific to our younger generations. This training will explore the link between social media and the escalating trends of mental and emotional disorders among youth. Moreover, the training curriculum will highlight the unfortunate phenomenon of cyberbullying and the digital tools used for child exploitation.

STRESSING STRESS

CONTENT:

Stressing Stress is a practical approach to dealing with stress. The focus will be on discovering how stress works, and how we can work through issues of stress to prevent burnout. The participants will get a chance to apply what they are discovering and create a self-care plan. This workshop explores the sources of stress impacting our life. Participants will develop new skills to deal with stress in their family (marriage, kids, etc.) The skills will help them cope with life.



THE BIASED BRAIN: UNDERSTANDING AND APPLYING HEURISTICS IN THE WORLD OF CHILD WELFARE

CONTENT:

Our brains constantly think, but sometimes our thoughts can be tricked. Sometimes our brains help us make sense of a confusing world, and sometimes the world confuses us. This workshop will help caseworkers to better understand the thought processes of youth and parents and how to appropriately respond not just to the behavior, but to the underlying thought processes as well. The workshop will also help participants understand how their own heuristics may be affecting their work

Working with Youth who Display Psychotic Features: Double Checking Reality

CONTENT:

Youth who display psychotic features are rare, but when it happens, we need to be able to assist the youth and their support system with practical help. This training delves into the world of youth psychosis. It will help participants discover and implement practical steps to help youth who are struggling with psychotic features. It will also explore how participants can assist caregivers in trying to help the youth.



SOGIE 101: WORKING WITH LGBTQ+ YOUNG PEOPLE IN CHILD WELFARE

DATE: MONDAY, DECEMBER 30TH **TIME:** 9:00AM - 4:00PM

CREDIT HOURS: 5.5 LOCATION: VIRTUAL

CONTENT:

LGBTQ+ youth are overrepresented in the child welfare system and are at greater risk of negative outcomes, including homelessness, suicide, and unhealthy risk-taking behaviors. LGBTQ+ youth need the support of the child welfare system to be able to meet their unique needs effectively. SOGIE 101 offers foundational information about sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression. It provides a safe space for self-reflection on internal bias and to discuss myths and misinformation so that child welfare staff can identify their needs in order to better understand and support the LGBTQ+ youth they serve. In addition, practical tools to integrate affirming practices into daily work activities will be introduced.
